1. Millennials, watch out:

New data from the FBI shows folks ages 30 to 49 are most likely to lose money to investment fraud. Oops. Social media and ads are some of the biggest ways criminals pass this stuff along. No big surprise: Crypto scams are especially lucrative.

2. Kids should not use this

app: This week, Mary asked about Wizz, a chat app aimed at teens. It was removed from the app stores after reports of perverts using it to send pics and messages to kids. Check your kid's phone for Wizz and remove it ASAP.

3. Opt out of advertiser tracking

Ever wonder why you see certain ads on your phone or computer? It all has to do with companies that track what you do online and what you buy. They use tokens to show you ads, which is called interestbased advertising.

The Digital Advertising Alliance (DAA) has a tool for you to decline letting these companies follow you around online using your email address or phone number. Yep — by using this tool, you can stop those personalized ads and tracking.

Don't worry, the DAA is a legit organization and doesn't use your email address or phone number for anything other than the opt-out process, and the hashed versions are automatically deleted after 30 days.

I opted out with my primary email address and cell number.

Opt out for free here. You're welcome. Where else can you get this valuable intel?

4. 10% of teens

Have tried to lose weight using diet aids pushed on social media. With names like "Nature's Ozempic" and "Flat Tummy Tea," these unregulated products are super risky, not to mention ineffective. Talk to the teens in your life!

5. \$9,200 for a misclick

The cost of one woman's accidental 70-night hotel reservation. She realized her mistake immediately and tried to get a refund just one minute later — but no dice. So far, the booking site, her bank and the hotel have all refused to help. Never save your credit card information on third-party websites. The convenience isn't worth the cost!

6. Email etiquette: It's not

always what you say but how it's received. "Per my last email" means "Uh, can you read? I already said that." Most people who write, "I might be mistaken, but ..." *actually* mean "You can't really be saying something that dumb, right?"

7. Alt + Tab: A keyboard shortcut pro Windows users know. Use it to cycle through your open programs quickly. On a Mac, it's Cmd + Tab.

8. Android and Apple users' privacy concern

Everyone can see your smartphone's name. Yep, anyone who tries to connect to Wi-Fi will see it in their list of discovered networks as a potential hotspot. That means if you use your real name as your phone's name, anyone with a smartphone or laptop can see it.

Hackers could use that information to zero in on who (and where) you are and AirDrop whatever to you. Now, *that's* creepy. The good news is you can easily change the name of your phone to something else:

- iPhone/iPad: Open Settings > General > About > Name.
 Tap the X, then type in a new name. Hit Done.
- Android: Go to Settings > About Phone > Device Name. Type in a new name for your phone, then hit OK.

9. The phone call no one wants



Not long ago, a woman named Robin was sleeping beside her husband, Steve. They live in Brooklyn with their two young kids. No, this isn't the setup for a joke; it's the setup for a nightmare scam that's becoming way too commonplace.

Robin was awakened by a phone call from her mother-in-law, Mona. "Must be a butt-dial," she figured. Then the phone rang again. When she picked up, she heard Mona sobbing, "I can't do it, I can't do it."

Then, a man she'd never heard before came on the line. "I've got a gun to your mom's head, and I'm gonna blow her brains out if you don't do exactly what I say." I'll cut to the chase. It was a <u>deepfake</u>. Robin's in-laws were never in danger — but she didn't know that.

What should you do if this happens to you?

These criminals bank on you losing your cool. They use every scare tactic in the book to keep you on the phone and doing exactly what they want. They almost always want money — as was the case for Robin.

Say you get a call telling you your daughter's being held for ransom. Your immediate priority should be to try to contact her directly. These scams fall apart quickly since the person was never in danger — but you won't know that until you can confirm.

This isn't the first time ... or the last time

I've been writing about this type of scam for a long time, and I'm seeing more reports of it in the news. It's frightening to think that just a few seconds of your voice can lead to a horrible situation for your loved ones.

I mean it when I say "a few seconds," by the way. Think about your voicemail messages. Leaving "Hello? Is anyone there?" or recording an outgoing "Hi, you've reached Jon! Please leave a message" is plenty for a cybercriminal to train AI to sound *exactly* like you.

That voice profile can be used in classic scams targeting <u>older</u> <u>family members</u> or <u>grieving relatives</u>, too. It's nasty stuff.

So what's the quickest and easiest way to avoid all this?

- Delete that custom outgoing voicemail message: The steps are slightly different for each device, but you can find the general rundown in our guide.
- Look on social: Remove or hide any videos in which you're speaking.

Get your personal info off people-search sites: This way, the scammers can't get your name and phone number. My radio sponsor, Incogni, does just this — <u>use promo code</u> <u>Kim60 to save 60%</u>. I don't get any residuals if you buy, fwiw.

The FTC has another piece of advice: Don't say a word That means if you get a call from a number you don't recognize, wait for the caller to speak first to see if there's a human there. If not, hang up — even if they talk and you think it's a scam.

This is important stuff, folks. Use the sharing buttons below to pass it on to the people you care about.

10+• SSN sharks: The FTC says Americans lost

over <u>\$126 million</u> to Social Security scams last year. **Reminder:** The real SSA won't slide into your DMs, rush you or threaten to suspend your SSN. Stay sharp, folks.

Free filing: The IRS is testing a free tax filing tool called Direct File in 12 states. *Finally!* Of course, there's a catch: It's only for folks in certain areas with specific incomes. Want in? Check <u>here</u> to see if you're eligible.

Screenshot snitch: Tempted to screenshot a "disappearing message" on Facebook Messenger? Think again — the app will now notify the other user. Imagine all the uncomfortable moments ahead for anyone who doesn't read my free newsletter!

Deadly trend: An 11-year-old boy tragically lost his life to a TikTok challenge called "**chroming**," which is huffing toxic chemicals to get high. The nightmare unfolded at a sleepover. He went into cardiac arrest and couldn't be revived, despite doctors' best efforts. This has to stop.

Know your Airbnb: Picking out the best (and worst) spots on Airbnb is about to get easier. Look for <u>labels</u> that highlight the top 25%, top 1% and bottom 10% of properties based on ratings. No more nasty Airbnb hidden camera surprises, I hope.
