After failing on its promise to launch an artificial intelligence-supercharged version of Siri in March, Apple said it's on track to make it happen in the new year. The stakes are enormous.

Apple's AI failure this year put even more pressure on it to deliver a breakthrough AI experience on the iPhone. Another whiff like that will only cement the idea that Apple is woefully behind its peers in AI and risks losing control

over the next major computing platform to a rival like [Google](#) or a startup like [OpenAI](#).

Not only that, Apple must prove to investors that AI can generate meaningful sales growth after years of post-pandemic stagnation. How Apple got here...

MacBook Pro 14-inch and 16-inch with M5 Pro and Max



Last fall, Apple launched its new M5 chip in three products: MacBook Pro, iPad Pro, and Vision Pro. But the new chip didn't yet offer Pro or Max versions, and the only MacBook Pro that received it was the 14-inch model.

[Reporting indicates](#) Apple will launch 14-inch and 16-inch MacBook Pros with M5 Pro and M5 Max early in 2026. Back in January 2023, Apple [debuted](#) M2 Pro and M2 Max versions of the MacBook Pro. We could see similar timing with the M5 launches.

New 12.9-inch MacBook

For years, analysts have called on Apple to release a low-cost MacBook that might better compete against Chromebooks and more affordable PCs. This year, it seems that may finally happen.

Apple is [reportedly](#) preparing a 12.9-inch MacBook that will run an iPhone-class A18 Pro chip and come in a variety of fun colors. Perhaps the best feature will be a rumored price of \$599 or \$699.

Analyst Jeff Pu is [expecting](#) the MacBook to ship in “mid-Q1 2026.”

iPad with A18 chip



Last year, Apple's base model iPad got a spec bump update with an A16 Bionic chip.

But [in the coming months](#), the next iPad is expected to launch with an A18 chip that will enable Apple Intelligence support.

Not much else is known about the new iPad. But it's generally expected to retain the same design, with updates being primarily internal.

iPhone 17e



Apple has one more iPhone 17 model in the works, and it's [expected](#) to launch very early in 2026.

Last February, Apple unveiled a [new member](#) of the iPhone family. The expected iPhone SE revision was actually branded iPhone 16e. Rumors later indicated Apple intends to update the 'e' model annually.

iPhone 17e [will pack](#) the same A19 chip as the iPhone 17, and the new Center Stage front camera too. It's also rumored to have [a pair](#) of design changes: the Dynamic Island instead of a notch, and thinner bezels. MagSafe support is coming too.

Like iPhone 16e, Apple's new budget model will likely cost \$599 and still offer only one rear camera.

M5 MacBook Air



Another new MacBook is coming early this year: the M5 MacBook Air.

Very little is known about the update so far, other than it offering the same 13-inch and 15-inch sizes as the M4 model. No design changes are expected either.

Like Apple's other M5 products so far, the MacBook Air will likely be light on changes besides the M5 chip itself and perhaps some smaller additional improvements.

M4 iPad Air



If you want the best possible iPad, the M5 iPad Pro is an [excellent option](#). But lots of users would be well off choosing the much more affordable iPad Air.

Rumors indicate Apple has an M4 iPad Air launching in the months ahead. There's reportedly an OLED iPad Air in the works, but it likely won't launch until next year. Instead, expect the M4 model to offer more power and likely new colors, but not much else different.

Wildcard: New Apple Studio Display



All of the above products are expected to launch in the months ahead. But there's another that might debut soon too: a new Apple Studio Display.

The new Studio Display is [rumored to add 120Hz ProMotion support with HDR, an A19 chip, and likely a new Center Stage camera](#). Since Apple doesn't update its Mac displays very often, we could see some big changes. Which early 2026 Apple products are you most interested in? Let us know in the comments.

E. macOS Tahoe icons do exactly what Apple said designers should never do


macOS Tahoe app icons came under fire late last year with commenters describing them as “terrible” and “objectively bad.” In our poll, 9to5Mac readers had [exceedingly mixed views](#).

Software engineer Nikita Prokopov has now drawn attention to the icons used within menus and pointed out that they almost exactly mirror the approach which Apple’s [Macintosh Human Interface Guidelines](#) advised against back in 1992 ...

[Prokopov](#) shared a graphic from the guidelines which showed what Apple described as an “ugly” menu, with each item having its own icon, contrasted with what the

company considered good practice, which was very few in-menu icons.

Figure 1-3 Don't use arbitrary graphic elements



He then points to Apple breaking this guideline with Tahoe menus.



Admittedly, resolutions have improved dramatically since those days, and it could be argued that in-menu icons

today are much clearer, but Prokopov argues against that too.

The main function of an icon is to help you find what you are looking for faster. Perhaps counter-intuitively, adding an icon to everything is exactly the wrong thing to do. To stand out, things need to be different. But if everything has an icon, nothing stands out.

He suggests the approach Microsoft took in the early days, with icons restricted to only the most commonly used functions, is a better one.

But it gets worse. He also points out that Apple uses inconsistent icons for the exact same function in different apps – Including things as basic as New. Depending on the app, Apple uses five markedly different icons to essentially mean the same thing.

As if that weren't bad enough, he also points to examples where Apple uses the exact same icon to mean completely different things! For example, the icon for a new note in the Notes app is the same one as the “edit address” icon in the Contacts app.

His [blog post](#) is illustrated with a great many examples, as well as suggested improvements using fewer icons and colour coding them. It's definitely worth checking out. Once you've taken a look at his examples, do share your thoughts in the comments.

A. iOS 26.2 Brings Upgrades for Liquid Glass, AirDrop, and Apple Music

The latest iOS update means more ways to enable Liquid Glass, new security features for AirDrop file sharing, and new ways to keep on top of your Reminders.

Apple has now rolled out iOS 26.2, bringing a few helpful—if small—new features for iPhone 11 or 2nd-generation iPhone SE and later users, MacRumors [reports](#).

If you enjoyed the Liquid Glass feature Apple added in iOS 26.1, it's now also being added to the Lock Screen. You can now use a slider inside your Lock Screen options to make the clock more or less transparent, while you can also still opt for a completely solid clock. In contrast, iOS 26.1 only made it possible to make your Liquid Glass material either Clear or Tinted. Liquid Glass is also being incorporated into other parts of the OS, including the Measure app, Apple's free ruler-like measuring tool.

If you're the forgetful type, the Reminders tab now has an option to add an alarm for when the reminder is due. You'll need to toggle the Urgent option when setting up the reminder to create the alarm. If you choose to snooze the reminder, it will show a Live Activity countdown on the Lock Screen that includes an option to complete the reminder or reschedule it.

The update adds a new layer of verification when you're using AirDrop with unknown contacts, allowing you to share files more securely. Apple has introduced an option to generate an AirDrop code on the device you want to share a file with. This code can then be entered on your device to complete the transfer. These codes allow AirDrop to work between the two devices for 30 days before automatically deactivating.

Apple Music is also getting a few helpful updates if it's something you regularly use offline. You can now see the lyrics to the song you're playing when not connected to Wi-Fi or cellular data...

B. iOS 26.1 Update Offers Liquid Glass

Controls, Bevy of Handy New Features

The first major iOS 26 update brings live translation improvements, streamlined gesture controls, new visual settings, and more. Updates are also available for iPadOS and macOS.

(Credit: Apple) Apple has launched iOS 26.1, its first update since the iOS 26 launch in September.

Compatible with iPhone 11 series and later and the second-generation iPhone SE devices, this update brings with it a number of quality-of-life changes, including new language support in Apple Intelligence, better live translation support, and improved gesture controls in a range of apps and services, among others.

Apple's iOS 26 debuted with an overhauled Liquid Glass visual design to give the latest iPhone OS a wonderfully uniform look. Call screening and hold assist were really useful additions, and the Spatial Scenes can make a real difference to wallpapers and photos. If we had any complaints, it's that there were some obvious bugs and the interface needed just a few tweaks here and there. Update 26.1 may fix most of our concerns.

The new update brings improvements to Apple Intelligence language support, adding Danish, Dutch, Norwegian, and Turkish, among others. It's also added Chinese (both simplified, and traditional) to Live Translation on AirPods, as well as Italian, Japanese, and Korean. Elsewhere, Apple has left-aligned text and icons for more comfortable interface viewing and navigation, and there's a new video scrubber in photos to slide through the few frames of animation.

Liquid Glass has been updated with a new option to choose between the default clear look, or a tinted look that can increase opacity in certain apps and notifications on the lock screen, making them easier to read. There are also new toggles in the Settings menu for haptic feedback, single-

touch actions, and lock-screen swipe to open to camera. In a tweak of its gesture support, Apple added "Slide to Stop" swipe actions to Alarms and Timers (so everyone stops turning off their alarm when they're trying to snooze) and the Music MiniPlayer now supports swipes to go to next and previous track.

The Fitness app has been updated to add support for custom workouts, letting you set your own exercise regime, and Apple has improved FaceTime audio quality in low-bandwidth conditions, so if you don't have great signal, you should at least be able to hear who you're speaking to, even if the video quality isn't excellent.

To better protect younger iPhone users, too, Apple has instigated a new Communication Safety and Web content filter system that will automatically limit adult website access on child accounts for ages 13-17 (although the specific ages do vary by region).

The new update also introduced Apple's Security Improvements feature via a revamped Rapid Security Responses toggle. You can turn this off and on in the Settings menu, but it effectively means security updates are installed automatically, speeding up your device's protective measures so you are never caught out.

You can update your device by going to Settings > General > Software Update. The update is available for all iPads and iPhones that are compatible with the iOS 26 update.



C. Apple iOS 26.3 Release Date: The First Major iPhone Update Of 2026 Is Almost Here

“Apple tends to ship its “x.3” iOS updates in late January. The dates move around by a day or two, but the window

stays nearly the same year after year. If Apple sticks to its recent pattern, iOS 26.3 should arrive in the last week of January 2026,” MacObserver reported.

There had been speculation that because iOS 26.1 landed later than is Apple’s custom, in early November rather than late October. But the Cupertino giant seemed to have caught up with itself after that, and the most recent big update, iOS 26.2, went on release on Dec. 12, even if that release took some commentators by surprise by landing on a Friday instead of the customary Monday or Tuesday.

One thing seems certain about iOS 26.3: there won’t be an accompanying iOS 18 release for those wanting to keep their iPhones safe from bugs and security risks. There was an iOS 18.7.2 release alongside iOS 26.1, and it looked like iOS 18.7.3 was on its way, but in the end that was only released for iPhones which aren’t capable of handling iOS 26....

D. 15 New Things Your iPhone Can Do in iOS 26.2

Apple this month rolled out iOS 26.2, the second major point update for iPhones since iOS 26 was released in September, and there are at least 15 notable changes and improvements worth checking out. We've rounded them up below.



Apple is expected to roll out iOS 26.3 to compatible devices sometime in late January 2026. Until then, here's what's new in iOS 26.2.

1. Set a Reminder Alarm




iOS 26.2 brings a new alarm capability to the Reminders app. When you create a reminder, you can toggle on an "Urgent" option so that, at the due time, your iPhone sounds an alarm rather than simply showing a notification.

2. Adjust Liquid Glass Clock




Apple's latest update adds a new slider under the "Liquid Glass" Lock Screen settings that gives much finer control over the clock's appearance. You can choose to make the time display nearly fully transparent, or more frosted and opaque, rather than being limited to the previous fixed presets.

3. AirDrop Files to People Not in Contacts




iOS 26.2 introduces a one-time Airdrop code system, letting you share files with someone even if they're not in your contacts. Once generated, the code remains valid for 30 days. Apple also includes a "Manage Known Airdrop Contacts" pane so that you can see and manage the people you've shared codes with.

4. View Apple Music Lyrics Offline



Apple Music is gaining offline lyrics support, so you can now view song lyrics in the app even when your iPhone isn't connected to Wi-Fi or mobile data.

5. Get a Better Sleep Score




If you wear your Apple Watch in bed, it's worth knowing that Apple has reworked its Sleep Score scoring tiers, with the aim of better matching typical sleep-quality experiences. Now, "Very Low" runs 0–40 (previously 0–29), "Low" 41–60, "OK" 61–80, "High" 81–95, and "Very High" 96–100 (previously labelled "Excellent").

6. Automatically Create Podcast Chapters



The Podcasts app can now automatically generate chapters for individual episodes. This means that rather than fixed chapter markers, the app will create them for you – and episode transcriptions now let you tap on mentions of other podcasts or links.

7. Manage Websites Where Passwords Aren't Saved



In the Passwords app's main settings menu, there's a new section allowing you to review and manage websites where you have deliberately avoided saving credentials. It gives you finer control over which domains are excluded from password storage.

8. Get AirPods Live Translation in EU

Apple's latest update expands the reach of AirPods Live Translation to countries in the European Union. The feature was previously unavailable in the EU due to Apple's ongoing regulatory compliance work.

9. Flash iPhone Screen for Alerts

In the Accessibility settings, under "Flash for Alerts," you can now choose to have your iPhone screen flash when a notification

arrives, rather than just the rear camera's LED flash. You can configure it to use the screen flash alone, the LED flash, or both simultaneously, giving you more flexibility for alert styles.

10. Quicker Access to Apple News Sections

The Apple News app gets a refreshed interface. The top-of-feed buttons now let you jump quickly into categories (e.g. sports, business, food, puzzles) instead of scrolling or tapping through menus.

11. Manage Safety Alerts

iOS 26.2 introduces an "Enhanced Safety Alerts" section in Notifications settings that centralizes earthquake alerts, imminent-threat alerts, and also includes a new location-based "improved alert delivery" option, helping ensure the reliability of alerts.

12. Sort Games by Size

In the Games app library, there's now an option to sort games by size (in addition to name or recent). It should prove useful if you want to clear storage or identify large games quickly. Beyond sorting, the update also brings support for controller-based navigation and real-time challenge-score updates while playing.

13. Disable Pinned Messages in CarPlay

For CarPlay users, iOS 26.2 lets you disable the new "pinned messages" view in the Messages app – restoring the older, classic messages interface if you prefer that simpler look while driving.

14. Replace Siri Side Button Functionality (in Japan)

For iPhone users registered in Japan, iOS 26.2 lays the foundation for replacing the default voice assistant triggered by the Side button from Siri to a third-party voice assistant (for example, Gemini or Alexa), giving users a choice at the system level for the first time.

15. Multitask More on iPad

For iPad users, iPadOS 26.2 restores some multitasking flexibility, and allows you to drag and drop apps from the App Library, Dock, or Spotlight into Split View or Slide Over. The change should make window and multitask management on iPad more fluid.

F. Apple Intelligence Guide

Apple Intelligence is what Apple calls its artificial intelligence feature set, previewed at WWDC in June 2024. The first Apple Intelligence features launched with iOS 18.1, iPadOS 18.1, and macOS Sequoia 15.1, and additional features came in iOS 18.2, iPadOS 18.2, and macOS Sequoia 15.2. There's still more to come, though, and the rest of the Apple Intelligence features are set to come later in 2025....



Quick Ways To Free Up Space

USE OPTIMIZED STORAGE

macOS has a feature called Optimized Storage. It can store files in iCloud. This frees up space on your Mac. You can access these files when you need them.

Go to System Settings > Apple ID > iCloud > Optimize Mac Storage.

More Advanced Methods


If the quick methods are not enough, try these:

REMOVE DUPLICATE FILES

Duplicate files waste space. Use a duplicate file finder app to find and remove them. There are many apps available for this.

CLEAN UP SYSTEM FILES

System files can take up space. Use a cleaning app to remove temporary files and caches. Be careful when deleting system files. Removing the wrong files can cause problems.

- Click the screenshot thumbnail that appears in the bottom-right corner, or

The screenshot will open in Preview by default.

Step 3: Print the Screenshot

1. With the screenshot open in Preview, click File in the menu bar.
2. Select Print (or press Command ⌘ + P).
3. Choose your printer.
4. Adjust settings such as:

 - Scale



The System Information tool can provide in-depth data about the hardware and software on your Mac.



If you're looking for specific hardware or software information about your Mac, maybe to troubleshoot a problem, perhaps to upgrade your system, or possibly to check on the versions of certain installed applications, you can dig up all that data and more through the Mac's System Information utility. Built into macOS, System Information provides a wealth of details about your hardware, software, and network. Here's how it works.

You can open System Information one of two ways. In Finder, click the Go menu, browse to Utilities, and in the window that appears, open the System Information app. Alternatively, click the Apple menu, select About This Mac. At the popup window, select System Report.

System Information starts with an overview of your hardware. The first screen shows your Mac's model name, processor name and speed, number of processors, amount of memory, serial number, and other data. In the left column is a list of main categories, and you can drill down to see details on specific components of that category.

Here are a few examples for the Hardware category. If you're having trouble coaxing sound out of your Mac, check Audio for info on your audio setup. Having issues with Bluetooth? Dive into the Bluetooth section. If your battery seems to run out of juice too quickly, take a look at Battery. Check Memory if you want to upgrade or replace your RAM. Go to Storage for details on your hard drive if you plan to replace it.

The Network section is useful if you're bumping into connectivity issues. Click the entry for Network for an overview of your ethernet and Wi-Fi components. The section for Firewall shows the current status in case any applications are being blocked on your network. Locations displays information on the different connections, such as ethernet and Wi-Fi. And Wi-Fi shows details on your wireless connection.

The Software section displays your macOS version and other info. If you need to know the version number for an installed program, go to Applications and scroll down the list. To see which fonts are installed, check out the Fonts category. And to find out which apps automatically start up, click the Startup items category.

You'll also find a few useful options via the System Information menus. To cut down on all the details displayed, click the File menu and select Show Less Information. If you're working with Apple tech support on an issue and need to send them details on your Mac, click the File menu and select Send to Apple. Finally, if you have to write down the serial number for your Mac but can't see the screen, click the File menu and select Speak Serial Number to hear it read aloud.

How to block annoying, reoccurring, unwanted website

Push notifications on your Mac

*You could see scams, spam, and phishing without quite knowing why. (i.e. MacAfee Warnings, subscription renewals, etc.)
A simple Safari setting solves it.*

Push notifications were the best thing since sliced bread when they appeared first in Android and later in iOS and iPadOS. Instead of requiring a lot of attention, a notification can appear briefly, is easily dismissed, and can be controlled—you can suppress apps from showing them all together, all the way to allowing Critical Alerts in some apps for events you absolutely don't want to miss a message about.

Apple gingerly added push notifications to Safari in macOS to let websites access the system-wide notification system because the

increasing reliance on web apps (a website that provides an app-like set of features) means you could have a tab open performing tasks that require your attention.

It's a double-edged sword, though: spammers, scammers, and assorted thieves and ne'er-do-wells take advantage of any opening to try to part you from your money through lies and fear.

A malicious site can leverage push notifications to fill the right edge screen with unwanted alerts.

How can this happen? You visit a safe site that, through the vagaries of ad networks, is hosting an advertisement that either you click on without realizing the danger or the bad ad runs illegitimate JavaScript to force open a window or prompt you to open one. You might also visit a URL for a site that has been hijacked or failed



to renew its domain registration, and now you're on a page of no repute.

However you get there, a malicious site incorporates a request in the page you load that triggers Safari to prompt you to ask if you want to enable notifications for the site or not. This is harder to trigger in iOS and iPadOS, which only allow notifications from web pages [you've added to your home screen](#).

Misleading messages on macOS Safari

When Apple first introduced the feature to macOS, it only allowed developers to trigger a standard dialog box that said Don't Allow and Allow, with Allow highlighted. Not long after, Safari began to [allow a custom opt-in message and design](#). The text that appears [can be entirely misleading](#): it's possible that you would click a button intending to not allow alerts and actually have opted in to them. **For instance, the text that misled one Macworld reader says:**

[space]ask you



***Confirm that you're not a robot, you need click
Allow***

I must have been taken in once because I found this entry in Apple menu > System Settings > Notifications on my Mac.

As long as the web page remains open, even if it's in a window or tab you're not viewing, it can send you notifications. **Because Apple shows the favicon of the website (a small icon set by the site owner), as part of the notification, it can be quite misleading.**

For example, in the figure below, the favicon is a System Preferences icon with a red dot overlaid.

A reader sent these screens of malicious notifications from the “Ask You” site.

That gives the impression it's a macOS notification **but it's not.**

Clicking the notification takes you to the web page trying to sucker you, and then the site tries to lure you into installing malware, typing in your credit-card number, or much worse.


All that said, you can easily defeat the creeps who set you up by disabling notifications. (And find and close that tab or window!)

In macOS:

1. In Safari, go to Safari >
2. Settings/Preferences >
3. Websites.

4. Find the entry for the website. If you can't find it by domain, look for the icon, as in the figure below.

5. Choose Deny from the popup menu to the right of the site name or select the item and click Remove.

How do you decide whether to choose Deny or click Remove?

- Choosing Deny means if you visit the site again, an alert about wanting to notify you won't appear.
- Removing the entry means it doesn't appear in the Notification settings/pane in System Settings/Preferences or in Safari's Websites list.



I had the malicious site described above set to Deny in Safari, **yet in Notifications** it was shown as enabled!

1. Go to Settings > Notifications
2. Find the entry for the home page web app by title, and disable notifications for it.
3. Also, you might want to remove that from your home screen altogether—that site is sending you unwanted notifications!



Apple's redesigned Phone app in iOS 26 introduces a unified view that combines recents, favorite contacts, and search on a single screen. But if you prefer the familiar tabbed interface from iOS 18, you can easily switch back to the classic layout.



The Classic Phone app layout in iOS 26


What's Different in iOS 26

The new unified design consolidates recent phone activity into one streamlined view in which your favorite contacts appear at the top for quick access. You can navigate to Contacts, Keypad, and Search through the bottom tab bar, while screens for voicemail and missed calls can be accessed via the three-line icon in the top-right corner.

Switching Back to the Classic View

If you don't get on with the new look in iOS 26, here's how to revert to the traditional Phone app layout:

1. Open the Phone app on your iPhone.
2. Tap the three-line icon in the upper right corner of the screen.
3. Select **Classic** from the popup menu that appears.



Your Phone app will immediately switch to the original iOS 18 design, with separate tabs for Recents, Contacts, Keypad, and Voicemail along the bottom.

Switching Back to the Unified View

Changed your mind? You can return to the new unified layout at any time in the following way:

1. Tap the three-line icon in the upper right corner of the Phone app.
2. Select **Unified** from the popup menu.

The unified view becomes your new default until you switch back again. Your preference persists across app launches, so you won't need to change it every time you open the Phone app.

Reduce Liquid

Glass Effects With Apple's New Toggle

With iOS 26, Apple introduced a radically new design material called Liquid Glass which focuses on transparency in order to let the content on your display shine through the controls. Not everyone likes it though – so Apple has responded by adding a new toggle in iOS 26.1 that lets you tone down the effects.



Any major design change can create controversy as people get used to the new look, but Apple's debut of Liquid Glass in iOS 26 proved particularly divisive, with its buttons and menus that change color and refract digital light like they're physical objects. Some people appreciate the translucent

effects, while others find them distracting or harmful to readability.


Fortunately, Apple has listened, and in its first iOS 26.1 point update now available, the company has introduced a new toggle that should hopefully ease some of the criticism. Apple says that the new setting was added after user feedback during the beta testing period suggested that some people would prefer to have a more opaque option for Liquid Glass.

The toggle lets you select from a clear look for Liquid Glass, or a tinted look. Clear is the current Liquid Glass design, which is more transparent and shows the background underneath buttons, bars, and menus, whereas tinted increases the opacity of Liquid Glass and adds more contrast.

Tone Down Liquid Glass in iOS 26.1

If you're not a fan of the look, or are having trouble with readability, then make sure that you update to iOS 26.1 when it's released (likely early November) and then follow these steps.

1. Open the Settings app on your iPhone or iPad.
2. Tap **Display & Brightness**.
3. Tap **Liquid Glass**.
4. Tap **Tinted** to increase opacity and add contrast, or **Clear** for more transparency.



That's all you need to do – the change is applied immediately. **If you're on macOS Tahoe 26.1, you can find the same setting available on your Mac in System Settings → Appearance.**
